LETTER BY THE WORLD FEDERATION OF TRADE UNIONS TO THE 16TH UNITED NATIONS GENERAL ASSEMBLY ON THE ALGERIAN PROBLEM

> On October 20, 1961, the Secretariat of the World Federation of Trade Unions sent the following letter to the Chairman of the 16th United Nations General Assembly in New York, asking him to be good enough to inform all delegates participating at the session, of its contents:

"Now that the General Assembly of the United Nations is taking up once more the debate on the Algerian problem, the World Federation of Trade Unions - on behalf of its 107 million affiliated members and confident that it is expressing the feelings of all workers - once again denounces the odious war waged by the French colonialists against the Algerian people who are fighting for national independence. - It demands the immediate and genuine application of the right of the Algerian people to self-determination and respect of the integrity of their territory.

"On November 1 it will be 7 years that this merciless war has been raging in Algeria.

"A whole people has risen with all its strength to win its independence, at the cost of the blood of hundreds of thousands of its sons. They fight an army launched against them by the French colonialists, equipped and supported by the aggressive NATO forces.

"But despite the use of this enormous machinery of repression, of military and police forces backed by para-military and civil groups of a fascist type, despite the loss of the best sons of the people killed in the struggle, despite mass executions and tortures, prisons, concentration camps and mass deportations of the population despite all this the French colonialists and their allies have not been able to crush the heroic resistance of the Algerian people.

"The consequences of this colonial war are felt also by the French workers whose solidarity is on the side of the Algerian workers. The war contributed to the installation of the system of personal power in France, which aids the trend towards wiping out democratic liberties in that country. It enables the monopolies to preserve and increase their colonial profits.

"It contributes to a great extent to the continuel worsening of the French workers' living conditions and stands in the way of many social advances which they need.

"This war, with its colonial and racial character, endangers social progress in Africa and in France and is a threat to peace and democracy in the world.

"Despite all efforts by the Provisional Government of the Algerian Republic supported by the workers and people of Algeria and of all countries, to reach a negotiated agreement, the French Government continues the war. It tries to convert the right to self-determination into an empty formality and sabotages the negotiations with the Provisional Government of the Algerian Republic, as was obvious at Melun, Evian and Lugrin.

"The W.F.T.U. supports wholeheartedly, as it has always done, the right of the Algerian people to self-determination, the right to the integrity of its territory and to freedom. It denounces emphatically the manoeuvres of the French Government which show that the capitalist monopolies want by all means to maintain their rule and the exploitation of Algerian wealth for their own profits.

"The W.F.T.U. emphatically calls on the General Assembly of the United Nations to take a clear and firm position against the colonial policy of the French Government and against the manoeuvres by which it brought about the failure of the previous negotiations.

"Just as emphatically it calls on the General Assembly to declare itself in favour of the immediate re-opening of negotiations between the French Government and the Provisional Government of the Algerian Republic, the only legal representative of the Algerian people. It underlines that it is the right of this Government to choose, as it thinks fit, its representatives at the negotiations, and the refusal of the French Government to meet some of them cannot be admitted.

"The W.F.T.U. is convinced that this is the only attitude the United Nations Organisation can take if it wants to satisfy the wish of the workers and people of Algeria and the whole world to see the end of this colonial war and to see the Algerian people gain national independence with the full integrity of its territory."

PLAN OF ORGANISATION FOR

THE INTERNATIONAL TRADE UNION COMMISSION ON SOCIAL SECURITY

Within the framework of the application of the decisions of the 4th World Trade Union Congress, the IIth Session of the General Council at Peking agreed to form an International Trade Union Commission on Social Security.

I. Aims of the Commission

The demands and hopes of the workers in the fields of Social Security are an important basis for joint actions against the attacks of the employers and governments of capitalist countries who try systematically to reduce expenditure on social amenities.

The main aim of the commission would therefore be to establish - on the basis of a deep analysis of existing social security systems in different parts of the world - the ways and means of struggle to guarantee new developments in united action and international solidarity by all workers and all trade union organisations without distinction, for the protection, extension and improvement of social security.

2. Nature of the Commission

The Commission must be broad and united, that is to say it must have trade unions representing all parts of the world taking part, no matter what their affiliation.

The documents as well as the conclusions adopted by the Commission will be submitted to the next Session of the Executive Committee which alone can decide what is to be done next.

Composition of the Commission

The Commission will be composed of trade unionists who are active at national level and have deep knowledge of the problems of social security in general and of social insurances in particular.

International Consultative Conference of Trade Unions and Workers in the Printing and Allied Trades (Leipzig, 25–28 November, 1961)

APPEAL

to Trade Unions and Workers in the Printing and Allied Trades throughout the World

Dear Brothers and Friends,

For a long time, on many occasions, the WFTU has received proposals from trade unions in Europe, Latin America, Africa and Asia that an International Consultative Conference of Trade Unions and Workers in the Printing and Allied Trades should be convened. The WFTU accordingly carried out a brief consultation, as a result of which printing workers' trade unions in Cyprus, China, Cesta Rica, France, Italy, Japan, Lebanon, Madagascar, Peru, GDR, USSR, Czechoslovakia and Uruguay, whether affiliated or not to the WFTU, intimated their agreement that such meting should be held.

An Organising Committee has been formed and, in the circumstances, it would appear opportune to call an International Consultative Conference which would examine the best means of promoting international unity of action, defending the workers' interests and strengthening cooperation and solidarity among workers throughout the world in support of their fight for economic and social demands, respect of trade union rights, the independence of the peoples, the ending of colonialism and the preservation of peace. It is in these struggles that the glorious traditions of printing workers must be reaffirmed.

The Conference, which will be held in Leipzig (GDR) from 25 to 28 November 1961, is open to all representatives of workers in the printing and allied trades throughout the world, irrespective of the political system of their countries and regardless of the national or international affiliation of their organisations.

The development of production techniques is to be found in every capitalist country today. The trade unions therefore have the common task of ensuring for the wides possible share in the progress resulting from such development and from production generally and, so far as the printing and allied trades are concerned, to see to it that those workers benefit from the progress made in the various printing systems and in the communication of human thought.

This action taken by the WFTU in arranging for the widest possible international meeting at which views and information may be exchanged on all princing workers' problems — on new production techniques, workers' security, social insurance and occupational diseases and general living standards — is of vital importance to all workers in this industry.

The following questions could be thoroughly debated at this Conference:

 What can be done in the clitical economic and social conditions of each e unitry, to solve satisfactorily the problems arising from the development of production techniques, modernisation of printing methods and constant mechanical progress in order to ensure better living standards for the workers by higher wages, shorter working hours without loss of pay, reduction of the physical and mental effort required and improved social services?

- How can we encourage activity in these countries to strengthen and protect the specific demands of printing workers, particularly young people and women, by developing accepted traditions regarding vocational training, in view of the drive to downgrade jobs which may well be facilitated by the introduction of new techniques and production systems?
- What can be done in these countries to create the economic and social conditions required for the widest possible cultural development and distribution of books and newspapers, to combat illiteracy, reactionary, chauvinist propaganda and racial discrimination conditions which are indispensable if the printing trade is to make real progress and to flourish?
- How can we ensure international solidarity, effective assistance and collaboration for all national trade union organisations of printing workers in a practical, enduring number and with full respect or the freedom of association and affiliation, ideological tendency and religious belief of each organisation?
- How can the functions and activities of trade unions in the socialist countries be developed to ensure improved living and cultural standards for the workers?
- How can we ensure success for the peoples' struggle for democratic rights, against imperialism, for liberation from the colonialist yoke, for the maintenance and defence of peace?

Education, science and progress — these are the messages which the printing workers wish to send out to the world every day through their work, messages that express their desire for peace, for there can be no progress and no happiness without peace.

In convening this International Consultative Conference of Trade Unions and Workers in the Printing and Allied Trades, the Conference Organising Committee and the World Federation of Trade Unions call upon all organisations to take part in this first meeting, which should be the prelude to stronger unity of action and cooperation between printing workers' trade unions as well as a practical affirmation of international solidarity among all workers.

SOCIAL SECURITY

At the present time, social security is taking on increased importance for all workers. Low wages, inflation, deterioration of working conditions and unemployment accentuate the workers' difficulties. In a number of countries a government policy favouring the monopolies, aims at lowering or eliminating the contribution made by the employers and the state to insurance or social security funds and limits budget expenditure for social purposes.

The need for social security schemes is felt even more keenly in under-developed countries, especially in view of the lower level of wages and the high number of unemployed. In the oppressed countries the establishment or improvement of social security schemes is daily becoming more indispensable.

The International Conference on Social Security, which met in Vienna in 1953 on the initiative of the W.F.T.U., drew up a social security programme agreed upon by trade union organisations of all trends.

The Conference defined the principles of social security according to which a system of real social security should be based on recognition of a fundamental social right guaranteed by law to every human being living by his own work, or who is temporarily or permanently incapacitated or unable to work, and also to the members of his family.

The Conference stressed that the right to social security is the same for all without discrimination as to race, nationality, religion, sex or age, just as there should be no discrimination based on occupation, nor any discrimination between the public and the private sector. Social security should guarantee all costs and social risks, including in the first place: sickness, maternity, disablement, old age, work accidents and occupational diseases, total and partial unemployment, death and family responsibilities.

Benefits paid under social security schemes should guarantee an adequate standard of existence and should be adjusted in accordance with rises in wages and in the cost of living.

working in this direction, the trade union movement ought to pay more attention than hitherto to social security. Its practical activity simed at continual extension of advantages already gained should be more consistent. Social security is one of the most important workrs' demands, a

permanent goal to be simed at by trade union organisations, a point which can bring together trade unions of all trends and a powerful factor for unity among all workers. It is therefore necessary to examine carefully the needs and aspirations of the workers in this direction, to formulate and defend demands which are capable of uniting them in action for common sims, and to find ways to extend unity of action, among them the setting up of broad national social security committees.

In particular, trade union organisations should work to increase working class participation in social security services and funds so as to give the workers majority representation and better control of their management and use. In countries where the workers' representatives play a leading part in the administration of social insurance, this has helped social security to develop in accordance with the needs of the workers.

In addition, the Congress recommends organisations to exchange delegations, experience and information at an international level, in order to develop international solidarity in working for social security.

The Congress recommends the A.F.T.U. and its Trade Departments to do more to achieve social security.

It proposes to establish as soon as possible a broad international trade union action committee for social security with the task of ensuring further united action and international solidarity among all workers and all trade unions without distinction, for the defence, extension and improvement of social security and social insurance schemes.



It underlines that it is the right of this Government to choose, as it thinks fit, its representatives at the negotiations, and the refusal of the French Government to meet some of them cannot be admitted.

The W.F.T.U. is convinced that this is the only attitude the United Nations Organisation can take if it wants to satisfy the wish of the workers and people of Algeria and the whole world to see the end of this colonial war and to see the Algerian people gain national independence with the full integrity of its territory.
