Dear Friends,

In the four years that have passed since the III International Conference, 1959, there has been a marked development in the industries of our field in various countries. The number of workers in our industries has increased. The development of technique and science as well as an increasing use of mechanical equipment have brought about changes in working methods and furthered production.

This development has not, however, gone evenly or in a continuous flow, but is still a clearly discernible trend in the present period.

During these four years many struggles have been fought to win our claims. Considerable successes have been achieved, especially when workers have developed and strengthened unity of action. But common for the capitalist countries is the fact that living costs have soared more rapidly than wages have increased.

The reasons for this are: the exploitation of the workers by the employers, the tightening grip by the monopolies over the riches of each country, which they place at the service of their own selfish aims. The capitalist system has shown its inability fully to utilize the productive forces and guarantee a continuous and planned development and social progress and to use the achievements of science and technique in the interests of the working masses.

The monopolies and the governments they control cannot, in spite of their demagogic promises, guarantee full employment, nor improvement of the material or cultural level when there is widespread unemployment over wider areas, low wages, misery and downright hunger.

A certain economic progress takes place in a few countries, but it is weak, unstable and marked by increasing profits and power for the monopolies and sharpening of the social and economic disproportions.

In the socialist countries our colleagues in the building industrys have won new victories. They have built new cities and factories. They have built millions of new dwellings and thus helped to solve this problem. They have helped to strengthen the economy of their countries, which have in this way overcome their difficulties and improved living conditions of the people. Women have the same rights as men, their wages are the same. Youth is under special protection by society and bright prospects lie open for them. The trade unions of the socialist countries carry increasing responsibility for social life. This is real democracy in full blossom.

The world picture has undergone great changes since 1959.

New people have achieved independence. The most important events in this field are the Cuban revolution and Algerian independence after 7 years of struggle. The peoples have grown



The V. World Trade Union Congress with its preparations and decisions have helped in achieving this. Simultaneously with stressing the danger from the mere existence of imperialism, the revanchist policy of the West German government, the growing militarism in Japan and the sanguinary policy of the USA and its war-blocs NATO and SEATO, the Congress underlined the changes that have taken place.

It is in the power of the peoples to hinder a new war. International disputes can be solved by negotiations. Peaceful co-existence can be realized.

The same holds true as to general and controlled disarmament, the achievement of which is mankind's most important task.

General and complete disarmament and the annulment of military spending would make it possible to satisfy social demands and would open the road to a new life for all humanity with safety being guaranteed for the first time in history.

September 24–28, 1963, the IV International Conference of Workers of the Building, Wood and Building Materials Industries will be held in Budapest, Hungary.

This will be the biggest and most important international gathering of workers in our trades. Our Trade Unions International comprising 8,600,000 members and being the biggest international organisation of workers of our trades calls on you to participate in this Conference.

The IV International Conference will enable exchange of opinion on broad basis, exchange of struggle experiences and on successes achieved by the building and woodworkers through organisational activity.

It will help strengthen unity and working class power,

The IV International Conference is open to members of all trade unions in our field and all workers irrespective of what trade unions they belong to and irrespective of their political, philopophical or religious opinion.

It strives to unite activity of all workers groups who have common interests. It strives to line out the most important claims, among which we find:

Higher wages

Improvement of living and working conditions

Shorter work hours

Acknowledgement and enlargement of trade union rights

The IV International Conference will be an important meeting showing the will of the building, wood and building materials industry workers to unite around the following demands:

Economic, social, cultural and human progress

Friendship between all peoples

National independence, destroying of colonialism
