Copy of press Note, dated July 1948, by the Govt. of India:

Under the mistaken belief that this will result in expediting the disposal of their pension claims, ex-servicemen or their families are addressing their petitions direct to the Adjutant-General, Army Headquarters, India, or the Military Accountant-General or the Controller of Military Accounts (Pensions) Allahabad, or the Joint Secretary, Ministry of Defence (Pensions Branch). This actually results in avoidable delay, as all such petitions have to be referred back to the regimental Centre or Record Officer concerned.

In their own interest, ex-servicemen and their families are advised to address all complaints on pensionary matters to the Officers Commanding the Record Office or the Regimental Centre or the Unit with which the individual served prior to his retirement or death who is responsible, not only to initiate the claims for grant of pension, but also to finalise action towards notifying the grant of these pensions.

It will then be possible for the Officer Commanding to take action as follows:-

To verify whether a claim for grant of pension has been initiated, and if so to forward the complaint to the C.M.A. (P), Allahabad. If a claim has not been initiated, to take necessary action for putting in the pension papers;

If a pension has been granted by the C.M.A. (P), Allahabad, but not notified, to take action for the immediate notification of the pension;

If a pension has already been sanctioned and notified, to inform the pensioner accordingly; and to refer such cases to higher authorities for consideration, if necessary.

Every district has its own District Sailors, 'Soldiers' and Air-men's Board and ex-soldiers should seek their advice, which is given free, before submitting their representations.



LABOUR RIVALRY HOLDS UP H M T PROGRESS (By our special Representative)

Mr. M.K.Mathulla, Managing Director of the Hindustan Machine Tools, is at present away in Delhi on his official round in connection with securing speedy sanction for the much-needed expansion programme of this key industry.

Meanwhile, the labour situation in the factory is none too happy. A recent lengthy resolution of the HMT Employees Association sets out with grave concern the unhappy position that seems to obtain there and squarely lays the blame on the management for shirking to settle the outstanding disputes, while intimidation in activities resorted to. The resolution further says that the actions in victimising active workers of the Union are highly reprehensible and not in consonance with the principles laid down by the Government of India as well as the code of discipline. But it is most unfortunate that the management has gone to the extent of even not permitting the President and the active workers of the Union to go to the union office situated in the colony to carry on normal trade union work etc., even allowing for over emphasis this reading does not speak well of the industrial situation in the factory. It needs to be examined to somewhat closely.

The virtual break down of the experimental Joint Council of Management in the HMT factory reveals some unhappy trends. It is unfortunate that this should have happened in a premier and vital unit of the public sector, where production and industrial relations were both excellent. This is indeed a matter for public concern. HMT is playing a very important role in accelerating industrial expansion in the country. Nearly 30% of its present production goes to meet the demand from the private sector whereas the Government depend for their bulk supplies largely on foreign imports. In spite of its constantly stepped up capacity HMT is hard put to execute orders on its hand. Finding it well nigh impossible to entertain all fresh orders. It is in the light of this situation that these strained labour relations acquire public importance.

One must concede that both the head of the management and leadership earnestly endeavoured to give this Joint Council venture a fair trial and make a go of it, for what it was worth and in the eyes of both it was worth quite a deal but as it turned out to be still born, that much is an undisputed fact, but what led to this has been a matter of unfortunate controversy. Perhaps a chronological recounting may help as clear some of the shady patches and convenient half lights that this picture contains, and gain a proper perspective.

Till very recently all was well with HMT and its industrial relations. Right from the beginning there was but one labour union, the HMT Employees Association who got on very well with the HMT management. This happy, almost enviable state of affairs continued till the consummation that this felicity led to. But the constitution of the Joint Council proved its own undoing and the very success brought about its reverse. Perhaps it was too good to last.

LABOUR RIVALRY:

The Pillai episode was the first intimation that the public got to know of the onset of trouble. It soon followed the break down of the Joint Council. This right about-turn was strange and sudden. The management quitted the representatives capacity of the communist led Association on the assertion that it could not muster even a mere 10% of the following amongst the labour force. How this discovery was made has not been convincingly explained. The labour leadership hotly deny this assertion and demand a secret ballot to prove it. Next came the splintering up of the labour into three factions. It is affirmed that an INTUC leader from Celar Gold Fields was consulted and his consent obtained for the Presidentship of the dissident group and before he could arrive on the scene, a congress sponsored section of workers had captured the group called Karmik Sangha.



But the INTUC leader was not to be thus thwarted. He soon gathered a few men into yet another organisation though nothing has been heard of this third union ever since. Thus to-day there remain but two contenders for official recognition which has been tantalizingly withheld, i.e. the old Association and the new sangha. It is significant that the sangha asks for recognition and revival of the Joint Council of management.

What is really disconcerting is the undesirable happenings that this split has led to. There are various accounts concerning them. Terrorisation is alleged to be warning away the workers from old union and forcing them into the new. Personal and party scores are presumably being settled ideological ruptures are undoubtedly obviously taking place. The vigilance of the police vans round the factory area is as till recently too constant to be explained away as accidental reference to this state of general unrest is of public importance in so far as this indicates the existence of an unhealthy atmosphere where such fact fissiparous tendencies are apt to find an unfettered play. The complacency of the management which was solicitous of cordial relations with labour till yesterday in not bothering to restore industrial harmony is indeed amazing. Mr. V. Kesava M.P. and a Director of the factory, openly accused in a statement issued on October 18, 1960 that some of the responsible officers of HMT were involved in the rivalry among the workers. Have the Delhi Gods connived? at what the internal pressure groups are striving to achieve. Even the Govt. of Mysore have not been able to bring about an amicable settlement largely because the management could not be persuaded to sit with labour for a tripartite agreement. It looks as though the rival unions have been able to force the issue of recognition. Trial of strength seems unavoidable.

Increased productivity and contented labour force, which is the real test, will have to justify these doings of the management and diverse labour leadership and that test may soon be.

DELHI REGION DEFENCE WORKERS ENDORSE  
GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEES' STRIKE DECISION

The Delhi Regional Conference of the All-India Defence Employees' Federation (AIDEF) was held in the CPWD Hall, New Delhi, on May 21 and 22, 1960, under the presidentship of Shri K.G.Sriwastava, Joint Secretary, AIDEF. 78 delegates from Pathankot, Amritsar, Jullundur, Ambala, ~~Saharanpur~~ Ferozepur, Dehra Dun, Muradnagar besides Delhi participated.

The conference discussed the Bombay resolution of Central Government Employees' Convention held on April 2 and 3, 1960. Representatives from the units gave reports on the preparations started in their stations to implement the directives of the Bombay Convention and the AIDEF.

In a resolution, the Conference fully endorsed the Bombay Convention's demands for revising recommendations of the Central Pay Commission regarding basic pay on the basis of 15th Indian Labour Conference decisions and linking D.A. with cost of living index and other demands of setting up departmental boards to fix trades and grades, recognition of trade unions on the basis of majority representation to be decided through ballot, and doing away with Rule 5 of Central Civil Service Conduct Rules and such other Rules which empower the Government to dismiss or discharge employees without proper inquiry and right of defence. The resolution endorsed the decision of all Central Government Employees going on general strike if negotiations with the Prime Minister (which is to take place as soon as the Prime Minister returns from abroad) fail and assured the Joint Council of Action of Central Government Employees through the All-India Defence Employees Federation that Defence workers of this region will faithfully carry out their directives. It also appealed to defence workers, to whichever unions they belonged and whatever may be their political or social thoughts to unite for this common struggle.

Shri Santokh Singh was re-elected as Convener of the Delhi Regional Committee. The conference decided to take some steps to further strengthen the organisation of the unions in the region, undertake tours and issue a Bulletin.

The delegates session was addressed by Shri S.M.Banerjee, M.P., Vice President, AIDEF, Shri P.S.Anjaneyulu, Secretary-General, National Federation of P&T Employees, Shri D.S.Rajaratnam, Secretary-General, Confederation of Central Government Employees and Shri J.Godinho, General Secretary, Civil Aviation Department Employees Union.

An open rally was held in the Cantonment on 23rd May and was addressed by ~~Shri D.D.Vashist, General Secretary, Northern Railwaymen's Union~~, Shri Jawahar Lal, Secretary, Coordination Committee of P&T Unions in Delhi and Secretary of the Delhi Branch of the Confederation of Central Government Employees, Shri Ramnath, member of the Working Committee of AIDEF from Punjab and others belonging to defence unions in this region.

RESOLUTION OF JOINT COUNCIL OF ACTION WHICH MET  
ON 23RD JUNE 1960

The Joint Council of Action carefully considered the reply dated 10th June 1960 received from the Secretariat of the Prime Minister to the letter addressed by the Chairman of JCA. The meeting deplores the attitude of the Prime Minister as reflected in that letter declining to meet the representatives of the JCA. The Prime Minister's contention that the recommendations of the Pay Commission amount to an award by a Tribunal is untenable. The very fact that the Government have unilaterally modified the recommendations is the proof in itself that it was never an award.

The Council regrets very much that the Prime Minister should have taken exception to the formation of a Joint Council, and is of the opinion that the creation of the Council was in exercise of the fundamental rights of the workers to organise to safeguard their rights as a means of collective bargaining under the Constitution. The Prime Minister's anxiety for the well-being of the employees and the improvement of their living standard is wholly inconsistent with his refusal even to meet the representatives of the employees to discuss their legitimate demands.

It is not seriously disputed that the Government's failure to stabilise prices has made considerable inroads in the real wages of the employees. The Council, therefore, while sharing the Prime Minister's concern for the successful fulfilment of Plans and aware of other grave issues of both national and international importance fails to appreciate how a legitimate effort to prevent a further deterioration of admittedly low living standard is "unbecoming".

Under these circumstances, therefore, the Council is compelled to reaffirm its earlier decision and calls upon all Central Government Employees to go on strike from the midnight of 11th July (zero hours of 12th July) 1960. The Council very much regrets the inconvenience which would be caused to the Public and wishes to emphasise that it is the Government's unhelpful and unreasonable attitude which has forced this course of action on the employees. The Council appeals to the public for its sympathy and cooperation in the employees' struggle for a fair deal. The Council urges the Central Government employees to stand united and determined to make this historic struggle for justice a success. The Council is conscious of the ordeal through which the employees may have to pass including the banning of the strike by the Government and yet feels confident that no amount of repressive measures will deter them from the chosen course of action.

PRESS COMMUNIQUE

The Delhi Civilian Defence Employees' Council in a resolution adopted at its meeting held this morning, expressed its anger at Prime Minister's partisan attitude towards their demands.

The resolution stated that while the Prime Minister has refused interview to the representative organisation of Central Government Employees, viz., the Joint Council of Action of Central Government Employees comprising of the All-India Railwaymen's Federation (AIRF), the All-India Defence Employees Federation (AIDEF), National Federation of Post and Telegraph Employees (NFPTE) and Confederation of Central Government Employees' Unions, to discuss their demands vis-a-vis the Central Pay Commission's recommendations, he has instead met Shri S.R.Vasavada of INTUC and discussed the issues with him.

The resolution went on to say that though the Prime Minister mentioned in his letter that the recommendations of the Central Pay Commission as an award, his own Government, under his Prime Ministership has changed the recommendations against the workers in respect of off-day on Saturdays.

This refusal of talks and settlement through negotiations leaves no other way before the Central Government employees than to resort to the last method of General Strike. Reports presented in the meeting showed that all Civilian Defence workers in Delhi Cantt., viz., COD, 505 Army Base Workshop, MES, Vehicle Depot, ASC Supply Depot, Station Workshop, etc., have taken strike ballot and overwhelming majority of workers - in no case less than 92 per cent - have voted for the strike. According to the direction of the Council and the All-India Defence Employees Federation, all unions will complete the procedure of sending strike notice on their heads of installations by tomorrow (20.6.60).

The meeting of the Joint Council of Action of Central Government Employees in Delhi from June 23 will decide on future steps in connection with the proposed strike and the local Council assured them of their wholehearted support.
