The Government of India, while accepting the recommendations of the Cement wave Board, inter alia resolved that the recommendations stipulated in the first phase should not be delayed on any amount.

These recommendations were to be implemented irrespective of any consideration. The Government also requested the employers, forkers and State Governments to take immediate steps to implement the recommendations of the stage Board in letter as well as in spirit.

We do not have any detailed report about the position or the extent of implementation of the Wage Board recommendations by the employer in your area.

It is at extreme importance that this office abound have an up to date and complete report about the position and state of implementation or the stand of the employers in this respect. If otherwise.

You are therefore requested to let us know positively by <u>July 25, 1960</u>, at that state the matter of implementation stands at present.

We would like to know the efforts made by us or the INTUC or other organisations, either in negotiation or through representations to the State Covernments, or agitation etc., to get the recommendations implemented.
