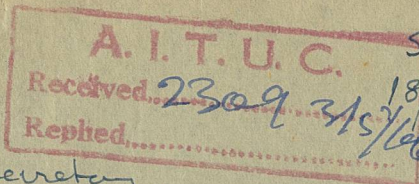

PRESS COMMUNIQUE

The Secretariat of the AITUC has issued the following statement:

"Our attention has been drawn to some reports published in a section of the press saying that one section of the AITUC is demanding some sort of 'oath of loyalty' from another section. To give credibility to the news, the words of the 'oath' have even been 'quoted' within inverted commas.

"This news is a pure fabrication designed to malign the AITUC and has been deliberately concocted to foster the belief that the AITUC cannot exist as a single democratic mass organisation uniting leaders and workers of various political ideologies and opinions. Currency has been given to it on the eve of the AITUC's 27th session in Bombay to create maximum confusion in the broad masses within the AITUC.

"However, the hopes of those who would like to see the AITUC split in the interests of the bourgeoisie are doomed to failure. The AITUC is bound to emerge from its 27th session as a stronger, more unified and broader organisation.

"Preparations are in full swing for holding the 27th session. Trade union organisations of a larger number of countries have already sent names of the fraternal delegates who will be attending the session."

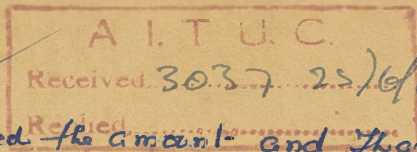

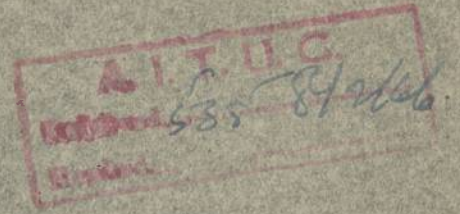



A.I.T.U.C. SESSION TO BE HELD IN BOMBAY

ON MAY 16-22, 1966


Shri S.A.Dange, General Secretary, AITUC, has issued the following statement:

"The 27th Session of the AITUC will meet in Bombay from May 16 to 22, 1966. Delegates will meet in a specially erected Pandal at the Purandare Stadium, Naigaum, Bombay.

"Prior to the Session, the Working Committee of the AITUC will meet in Bombay on May 14 and 15 and the General Council will meet on May 16 morning.

"Among the distinguished fraternal delegates attending the Session is RENATO BITTOSSI, President of the World Federation of Trade Unions. Fraternal delegates from trade unions of Soviet Union, Bulgaria, Hungary, Czechoslovakia, ^{Mongolia,} Yugoslavia and other countries are also attending the Session.

"About two thousand delegates from all parts of India are expected to participate in the 27th Session. In view of rationing, scarcity and lack of accommodation in the City of Bombay, the AITUC has directed affiliated unions to send only entitled delegates to the session and not to include visitors or observers in union delegations."

Summary of proceedings of the Meeting of the
Committee on Labour Management Co-operation
held on 1st May, 1961.

1. The Second item on the agenda, ~~namely Revised~~ Brief Report on the working of Joint Management Councils, was taken up for discussion first. Shri C.H. Desai mentioned one difficulty he was experiencing in Arvind Mills, Ahmedabad. In the Mill election of pratinidhis held a few months back workers' representatives on the Joint Management Council were not re-elected, presumably because the workers had lost confidence in them. But the Textile Labour Association had not replaced the old representatives on the Joint Council with the result that the new Pratinidhis and the workers generally resent the old representatives continuing on the Joint Council. They are reluctant to abide by the decisions reached at Joint Council meetings attended by the old representatives. Shri M.S. Krishnan suggested that instead of workers' representatives to the Joint Council being nominated by trade unions, they should be elected. The Chairman pointed out that the policy in this regard has already been laid down and the question should not be re-opened. Dr. Melkote agreed that while the worker representatives on the Joint Management Council should enjoy the confidence of the workers he would give his final views on the subject after knowing his organisation's views in the matter. The Chairman explained that so long as workers representatives on the Joint Management Council were nominated by the trade union of which the old Pratinidhis as well as the new Pratinidhis were members, the choice of who should represent the workers on the Joint Management Council should be left to the Union. However, he suggested that the union should in such circumstances consider the situation afresh and decide whom they want to place in charge of the management council.

2. Shri Jatin Chakravarty pointed out that complete reports on the working of Joint Councils in all undertakings which have set up Joint Management Councils have not been circulated. He mentioned that if, as suggested by the Second Seminar, a Special Officer had been appointed exclusively for the purpose he could have drawn up detailed reports on the working of the Joint Management Councils. It was explained that one of the decisions of the Conference relating to the public sector was that a special officer should be appointed for the public sector. Steps are being taken by the Ministry of Labour and Employment to implement this recommendation. It was also explained that an officer has been appointed in the Ministry for looking after this work although he is not exclusively on this. The Chairman emphasised the need for adequate arrangements at the Centre. He stated that there has to be constant evaluation and constant observation of the working of the scheme. He suggested that the management of each undertaking in which Joint Management Council has been set up should designate some one to look after the Joint Councils; and so should the union. Every quarter a report on the working of the Joint Council should be furnished to the Ministry jointly by the persons so designated. The Officer of the Ministry should also make an assessment every three months.

P.T.O.

3. Shri Jatin Chakravarty recalled the earlier proposal that special machinery should be set up for this purpose at State level and suggested that such reports should be prepared through the State level Machinery also. The Chairman stated that he would write again to the State Governments in pursuance of the recent discussions at the Labour Ministers Conference and the Standing Labour Committee emphasising once again the need for appointing a whole time officer in States where at present none exists.

4. Dr. Melkote drew the attention of the Committee to the report that absenteeism has increased in some of the units which had introduced the scheme of Joint Management Councils. Shri P.M.Menon explained that absenteeism has increased on account of other reasons, particularly on account of the Employees State Insurance Scheme under which cash payment is allowed for absence on account of illness. Dr. Melkote suggested that it would be useful to undertake a study about absenteeism in order to find out whether increase in absenteeism is due to the workers taking more leisure. The Chairman agreed to consider the proposal.

5. It was decided that the reports on the working of Joint Management Councils in each undertaking should be circulated among the members of the Committee on Joint Management Co-operation and the Unions and the Management concerned.

6. Shri V.K.R.Menon emphasised the need for circulating available information. He also expressed satisfaction about labour management councils dealing with productivity problems at the plant level. He stated that the I.L.O. Mission could help in the matter of production and productivity problems faced by Joint Management Councils through their experts. Shri H.D.Shourie suggested that the productivity committee at the plant level should be a sub-committee of the Joint Management Council.

7. It was decided that wherever Joint Management Councils have been set up they should meet regularly every month irrespective of whether or not there was an agenda. In the absence of other agenda subjects, any information given by the management or problems of production could be discussed. In fact, information and productivity could be constant items on the agenda.

8. It was decided that the Central Organisations of Employers and Workers concerned should examine the reasons for Joint Management Councils in some of the undertakings stopping to function.

9. It was agreed that the question of rotating the Chairmanship of Joint Management Councils between the management and workers representatives should be left to be decided by each council.

10. It was suggested that difficulties regarding implementation of unanimous decisions of Joint Management Councils could be over-come if management associates with the Joint Council at a high level executive.

11. Shri C.H.Desai invited the attention of the Committee to the discussions on the subject at the INTUC Conference at Jamunanagar and expressed concern about some of the statements made, such as that Joint Management Councils would evolve into an arrangement for workers to share the powers of management. The Chairman explained that the present features of Joint Management Councils are not exhaustive. At present it is an elementary participation of a very rudimentary character and this should grow. He suggested that if the employers organisations had any reservations in the matter they should write to the Government.

12. The importance of the programme of workers education in the context of Joint Management Councils was discussed. The Chairman suggested that a special programme should be taken by the Workers' Education Board.

13. Shri H.D.Shourie emphasised the need for promotional literature and suggested the preparation of a Brochure covering 15 to 20 pages on the principles, constitution, functions, etc. of Joint Management Councils. He also mentioned the need of educating the management regarding Joint Councils. Shri Jatin Chakravart suggested the preparation of large posters similar to those prepared in connection with the Code of Discipline. The Brochure which is to be prepared should be printed in regional languages also.

14. Shri M.S.Krishnan suggested that the scope and functions of the Sub-Committee should be defined precisely. The Chairman explained that good intentions and good relations were more important and without good relations the sub-committees would not function effectively even if their functions were more clearly defined.

15. Discussion on item I of the agenda, namely, Joint Management Councils in the Public Sector, mainly centred round the acceptance of the Code of Discipline in public undertakings.

Main conclusions

1. The Management of each undertaking in which Joint Management Council has been set up should designate some one to look after the Joint Councils and so should the Union. Every three months persons so designated should prepare and furnish to Government a joint report on the working of the Council. An officer of the Ministry of Labour and Employment should also make an assessment every three months.

2. The Special cell for Joint Management Councils set up at the Centre should be adequately strengthened.

3. The Labour Minister should write to the State Governments in pursuance of the discussions at the Labour Ministers Conference and the Standing Labour Committee requesting them to appoint a whole time officer wherever there is none at present.

4. Government should consider the proposal to undertake a study about absenteeism to find out whether increase in absenteeism is due to the workers taking more leisure.
5. The reports on the working of the Joint Management Councils in each undertaking should be circulated among the members of the Committee on Joint Management Cooperation and Unions and the management concerned.
6. It was decided that wherever Joint Management Councils have been set up they should meet regularly every month whether there was any agenda or not. Information and productivity could be constant items on the agenda.
7. The Central Organisations of Employers and Workers concerned should examine the reasons for Joint Management Councils in some undertakings stopping to function.
8. The question of rotating the Chairmanship of Joint Management Councils between the Management and Workers' representatives could be left to be decided by each Council.
9. Difficulties regarding implementation of unanimous decisions of Joint Management Councils could be overcome if Management associated with the Joint Council had a high level executive.
10. The Workers' Education Board should take up a special programme for educating workers about their role in Joint Management Councils.
11. A brochure covering 15 to 20 pages should be prepared setting forth briefly the principles, constitution, functions and working of Joint Management Councils. The brochure should be printed in Regional languages also.

AN ASSESSMENT OF LABOUR-MANAGEMENT CO-OPERATION
IN KERALA STATE TRANSPORT.

The report presented by the Labour Ministry on the working of the Management Board and Staff Councils in the Kerala State Transport has only academic interest now. Both these bodies ceased to exist and whatever examination is held now is post mortem.

The Central and District Staff Councils have all been dissolved an year back. And no fresh elections have been held to date, reportedly because of opposition from the INTUC which knows that they might not win the elections if held. Even before formal dissolution, these councils were not allowed to function after the new Kerala Ministry assumed power.

The State Transport Board has also not functioned after November last. No meetings were called. In May 1961 Government divested the Board of all powers, converting it to a mere Advisory body. We have been told this is on insistent pressure from the Government of India, Ministry of Transport.

The Board was constituted in 1958, during the regime of the Communist Ministry as a high-power body with the Minister of Transport as Chairman, a Deputy Secretary as Secretary and with the Finance Secretary, Secretary dealing with Transport, and Labour Commissioner among the members, along with the employees' representative. There was also an independent Accounts Member. This was not only a step in the direction of workers' participation in Management but also meant to secure a considerable measure of autonomy and flexibility which are vital for the successful working of a commercial undertaking. Further this meant liberation from the cumbersome procedural delay suffered by the Department and the employees.

The Constitution of the Board was on the basis of the recommendation of the Transport Enquiry Commission Report of 1956, and on the model scheme prepared by Union Transport Ministry for the Post and Telegraph Board.

But as soon as the new ministry took power in 1960 the constitution of the Board was modified. The Minister, the Deputy Secretary who functioned as Secretary to the Board, and the independent Accounts Member were done away with. Financial Control reverted to the Finance Department of Government. In place of the Minister a member of the State Revenue Board was nominated Chairman and the Transport Director, the Secretary.

The employees' representative was quietly dropped from the four member Administrative sub-committee of the Board which took all the decisions on behalf of the Board between meetings of the Board.

A Tender Committee has been formed in 1958 for making purchases and including the employees' representative of the Board. The purchases involve annually more than 2 Crores rupees. This Committee was slain with one stroke, on the ground that it was "superfluous" and that purchases can as well be made through "the normal channels".

After these changes, the meetings of the Board became a mere farce. From February to October, 1960, only three meetings were held and even at these no major question was discussed.

All major matters were decided by the Chairman himself; an instance was the Department's decision not to buy the Soviet diesel imported by the India Oil Company and the deal they struck with the

After October, even formal meetings were abandoned.

And now it has been decided that the Board does not have any statutory validity and cannot therefore take any decision involving expenditure from the Consolidated Fund under Article 266 of the Constitution.

The changes in the composition of the Board effected in 1960, which was derogatory to its status as a high-power Body only helped those who would not put up with it and led to its demise.

The New Kerala Ministry was not very much enthusiastic about it, at first. Later on they realized that the autonomous functioning of the Board under a high official stood in the way of the Government exercising direct control. The experience in the past had been the Government directly meddling with every small matter. The Transport Department Enquiry Commission had criticised this in strong terms in its report of 1956. Now Government found that with the Board functioning such interference was more difficult.

What brought matters to a head was however the comprehensive nationalisation programme prepared and adopted by the Board. This 10 year programme was not to the liking of the Kerala Pradesh Congress leadership which controls the State Cabinet. With the Board deprived of its powers, the whole programme is again unsettled.

Added to this, was the game of scuttle played by the Union Transport Ministry. Though the State Transport Board was modelled on the lines of the Posts & Telegraphs Board set up by Dr. Subhrayan, the Union Government developed a mistake for it. They wanted the Kerala State Transport to be converted into a Corporation under the Road Transport Corporation Act 1950. The Board could easily be rival to the idea of a Corporation, and it is reported that the Union Ministry was instrumental in getting objections raised by the Accountant General.

Now with regard to the element of workers' participation in the functioning of the Board. The foregoing paragraphs have already indicated that the workers participation was only one of the several considerations which Government had in view in constituting the Board.

It will also be clear that the composition and functions of the Board in the KST were basically different from those envisaged for Management Councils at the Seminar held in January 1958 at New Delhi.

The KST. Board was in the main an Administrative Board and more analogous to the P & T or Railway Board.

From April 1958 upto July 1959, when the Minister was Chairman of the Board it was mostly smooth sailing. The proposals for decentralisation of functions of the department, a formula for extension of the nationalization, revision of freights and fares, etc., were in this period worked out by the Board in close co-operation with the workers. After July 1959, things changed and the atmosphere of mutual Co-operation began to vanish.

The employee representation was limited to actual employees. But the facilities offered to these employees members were too meagre for effective functioning as members. For example special leave in connection with the Board's work for these members was limited to 2 days in the month. They were not furnished all necessary data re: matters discussed at Board meeting. Agenda papers were circulated only on ~~the~~ the eve of the Board meetings leaving little time for studying them. matters of importance relating to workmen were only cursorily dealt with or left over, or even refused to be discussed. Most of the questions placed before the Board were, as mentioned earlier decided either the Chairman or by the Small Administrative Committee.

At the meeting of the Board, it was well nigh impossible for the employee representatives to raise questions on their own or initiate discussions.

It may be borne in mind that all the other six members out of a total of eight were high-ranking officers, and the employees' representatives were only two. The presence of the Labour Commissioner was of course helpful but he was pressed down with a multitude of other problems and could not find much time to devote to the State Transport Board's work.

The result of all these had been that in the eyes of the workers, the whole thing was reduced to a farce, and the general run of workers lost faith in such machinery.

The demise of the Board therefore is "unwept, unsung and unhonoured".

STAFF COUNCILS.

The story of the Staff Councils is one of the sabotage by sweet smiling villiany. These Councils were constituted with workers majority, and the Management representatives dared not adopt a "high mighty" attitude. And so they let things drift in any direction.

It was possible for any member to move any omnibus resolution and carry it through.

No serious opinions were offered from the Management side, however controversial the questions involved. The active Co-operation and Guidance of the management members were not available for effective, concrete and serious discussion.

The direct consequence of this was that 90 per cent of the resolutions passed remain unimplemented. The workers began to lose faith as quickly as hopes were raised at the initial stage.

2. The implementation of the decision approved were also defective. Implementation was supposed to be through certain sub-committees, but these committees were not functioned properly. There were several instances where facilities were not offered to the sub-committee members to function, leave, office premisses stationary, travelling allowance, etc. were not given.

3. Discussions were not properly organized. Although there were agenda committees, matters not dealt with by the agenda committees were freely admitted by the Chairman, so that at the time of dissolution of the committees 80, 90 and 100 items were pending. A number of resolutions could not be discussed and were kept pending discussion for months to-gether.

Notes on the items included in the agenda were never prepared and circulated prior to the meetings so that members could consult their constituents beforehand. The form and time-limits for discussions were not regulated.

In spite of insistent demand, reports were not made to the Council, on the action taken and the stage at which matters recommended by the councils rested. All blame was placed at the doors of the State Government Secretariat for the delays occasioned. This was possible because both the Chairman and Secretary were from the management side.

4. The Councils included in their scope discussion of pay-scales, hours of work etc. The experience of this was none too happy. For some time it looked as though backward workers would take these Councils

for better instruments of collective bargaining than the Trade Union. Some amount of disruption actually took place, on the line Union versus Workers, and between various classes and layers of workers themselves, and a lot of haggling. But disillusionment quickly came and further disruption was avoided.

5. The admission of individual grievances for discussion proved to be quite unwholesome. Firstly, it was a cover for not adopting a regular grievance procedure. Secondly it distracted the Councils' attention from essential matters.

6. Even with all these shortcomings, upto a certain period and till the time the political tide turned against the working class movement albeit temporarily, these councils were utilized for bettering conditions of day-to-day work at the districts (branches) and the Department as a whole.

Special mention deserve to be made of the improved efficiency of operations achieved, as acknowledged in the Labour Ministry's report.

7. But the political tide turned too soon to consolidate these achievements, and place these councils themselves on a better and firmer footing. After July 1959, these councils were convoked with lesser and lesser frequency. The congenial atmosphere at the meetings also changed. Members of the councils who were exempted from transfers so as to enable them to keep in contact with their electors began to be transferred from place to place helter-skelter. And in the vacancies of those transferred, the Management began to make nominations unauthorizably.

The INTUC wanted these councils to be dissolved because they had very little or virtually no representation. They also wanted in the alternative the single non-transferrable vote system adopted for election to these councils to be substituted by a system of cumulative voting.

Within a few months of the present coalition Ministry assuming office the councils were dissolved. It is months now since dissolution. The State Transport Employees Union has demanded fresh elections immediately, but Government have not issued any order to date.



PRESS COMMUNIQUE
